Why Mark and Liz chose to become Hamlin monthly givers

“I’m Mark. I own and run a self-storage business. My wife, Liz is a registered nurse and we have four children. We both attend our local Baptist church, which also has a gym where I volunteer as a handyman.

While I was at the gym, I picked up a book from a small library in the foyer. I was immediately captivated by the story of Reg and Catherine Hamlin and this book, *The Hospital by the River*, had a lasting and profound impact on my life.

I had previously been on two trips to Kenya so I was intrigued as the book centred on Africa. The plight of the women [with obstetric fistula] in Ethiopia just tore at my soul.

As a father of three girls (and a son), I was appalled at the abysmal medical conditions these women faced. To be outcasts as well just seemed too cruel.

By becoming Hamlin Monthly Givers, Liz and I can support Hamlin’s important ongoing work. It seems such a great sustainable model which will carry on into the future.

Patients stay in such a caring environment, surrounded by gardens, while they are treated.

Some continue to live at Desta Mender (Hamlin’s rehabilitation centre) if they are unable to return to their home.

A new life for prolapse patient, Selenat



Selenat* lives in a poor remote village in Southern Ethiopia where subsistence farming is the only source of income for her family.

In April last year, Selenat was found by a Hamlin patient identification officer and taken to Hamlin's Yirgalem fistula hospital for surgery. After 25 years, Selenat is healed and free from suffering.

Thanks to your support, Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia provides surgery for a range of gynecological conditions in addition to obstetric fistula repair, including advanced stage pelvic organ prolapse.

Selenat's prolapse injury occurred during the home birth of her fourth child. She endured her injury for 25 long years, resulting in advanced stage pelvic organ prolapse (POP). It ruined Selenat's marriage and she could not work. She stayed home in pain and stress.

Selenat says, "I never thought that I could get cured. Thanks to everyone here I am now a free woman ready to face life challenges by myself. I wish I had known you earlier but still feel so happy and I am ready to begin life again. Thank you."

Meet Hanna, Project Zero Team Leader

Hanna Tesfaye is the Team Leader for the pilot of Hamlin's ambitious new program, Project Zero in Ale Woreda (district). She trained as a midwife at the Hamlin College of Midwives and has a Master's degree in public health.

Hanna met Dr Catherine Hamlin at the College and shares her vision of eradicating obstetric fistula in Ethiopia. Hanna's team is raising awareness of fistula in the community and finding women with historic fistula injuries so they can receive treatment and immediate care.

"If a woman is free from obstetric fistula, she's a backbone of the family. She's a woman. She's a sister, a mother and a wife. The family will be productive and future generations will be productive." - Hanna

Hanna's team is also preventing new fistula cases by improving the quality of and access to maternal healthcare across Ale Woreda.





Hamlin midwives are saving more lives through Project Zero

Never have Hamlin midwives played a more pivotal role in eradicating obstetric fistula and improving maternal healthcare across Ethiopia.

Project Zero includes expansion of the Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia Prevention program. Our goal is to establish a midwifery clinic in every woreda (district), staffed by Hamlin midwives who have trained at the Hamlin College of Midwives.

A comprehensive antenatal program is also being introduced to ensure all pregnant women deliver safely and new cases of obstetric fistula are prevented.

A new app called Maternal Health Improvement Tool (M-HIT) is being used by Hamlin midwives to monitor pregnant women and escalate care for those at risk.

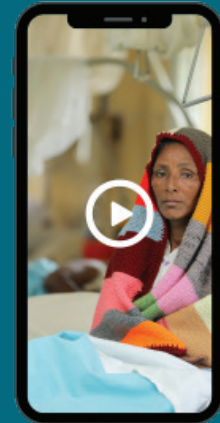
Your support has freed Ayinalem from her fistula injury and a life of misery and solitude.

After months of hiding alone and in shame with her fistula injury, Ayinalem heard a Project Zero radio announcement urging her and other women with fistula to come to Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia for treatment.

Ayinalem’s life was transformed by a simple fistula repair surgery at Hamlin’s Metu fistula hospital. Up to 31,000 Ethiopian women like Ayinalem still live with the pain and indignity of an untreated obstetric fistula injury - and up to 1,000 new cases occur each year.

Our mission is to make these numbers ZERO. With your support, we are confident it will be achieved.

Jamie Thomson completed his first barefoot walk in North Wales, UK in May last year – and raised over US\$3,300 for Catherine Hamlin Fistula Foundation! It was such a positive experience he decided to do it again!

In May this year, Jamie and his parents and sister challenged themselves to walk a 31 mile section of the Shropshire Way, near where Jamie grew up.

Jamie says, “I trained for about three months, so that my feet would be up to the challenge. At first, the weather did not look promising but we ended up having plenty of sunshine.

The path took us through the Shropshire Hills Area of

Outstanding Natural Beauty – a well-deserved name.

I read *Healing Lives* by Sue Williams during the walk, which kept me motivated and focused. It’s a great book to learn about obstetric fistula in Ethiopia, the great work pioneered by the Hamlins and the amazing ongoing care provided by Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia.

I completed 37 miles barefoot over 6 days and my feet were still in good shape at the end! Most importantly, I raised over US\$4,600 for Hamlin, which I’m so pleased about.”
