Over more than 60 years, pioneering Australian Dr Catherine Hamlin, her husband Dr Reg Hamlin and the clinical team at Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia have provided more than 60,000 women with life-changing treatment, built six fistula hospitals, a rehabilitation and reintegration centre - Desta Mender, the Hamlin College of Midwives and more than 90 Hamlin-supported midwifery clinics across Ethiopia.

Dr Catherine Hamlin's goal was to eradicate obstetric fistula in Ethiopia, so that every woman can be free from this atrocious childbirth injury. No other woman, or man, has done as much to eradicate this preventable, crippling condition and give these women back their lives.

Whilst enormous progress has been made, it is estimated up to 31,000 Ethiopian women still live with an untreated obstetric fistula injury. Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia is working hard to locate them in remote areas of the country and repair their injuries. In addition, each year approximately 1,000 new fistula cases occur in Ethiopia.

While the eradication of obstetric fistula in Ethiopia once seemed impossible, it is becoming a reality that will be achieved because there is a growing movement of generous supporters who are determined to see this dream come true.

Your Adventure

This unique itinerary provides an insider's visit to the famous Hamlin Addis Ababa fistula hospital and the country that Dr Catherine Hamlin called home for more than half a century.

We begin our journey in Ethiopia's capital, Addis Ababa, with three days to explore the city and visit Hamlin's Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital, Desta Mender - Hamlin's Rehabilitation and Reintegration Centre and the Hamlin College of Midwives. We then fly south to Jinka, the gateway to the Omo Valley and once a crossroad for droves of people migrating through Ethiopia. Today, it is undoubtedly one of the most unique places on earth given the sheer diversity of tribal groups living in this remote area of the Great Rift Valley. This is an extraordinary opportunity to immerse in the fabric of some of these societies, including the Ari, Mursi, Konso and Karo tribes, each with their distinct culture.

Continue to Yirgalem where you will visit Hamlin's regional fistula hospital and a Hamlin-supported midwifery college In a land of contrast, we'll visit the largest market in East Africa, experience a traditional coffee ceremony and if we're lucky, see monkeys and hyenas. The journey concludes back in Addis Ababa with the 10km Great Ethiopian Run (or walk!).

This trip will not only have a profound effect on your life but also the lives of so many Ethiopian women.

Detailed Itinerary

DAY 1 Arrive Addis Ababa

After all your preparations and fundraising the journey finally begins!

Upon arrival at Addis Ababa Bole International Airport, you will be met by our local Ethiopian guide and transferred to your hotel to freshen up and have lunch. Afternoon at leisure.

In Addis Ababa

Today we'll spend a day exploring Addis Ababa. This morning we visit the historical sites including the Red Terrors Martyrs Museum which honors the victims of Mengistu Haile Mariam's Derg Regime. Anywhere between 500,000 and 750,000 people were tortured and killed during the brutality. We will continue to Mount Entoto which rises to an altitude of 3200m and offers a panoramic view of the metropolis. Later we'll head out to a mountain community where the women create the Hamlin "Bullets to Beads" jewellery, made from melted down bullet casings found on Ethiopian farm land. If time allows we will also visit the National Archaeological Museum, which houses the 3.6 million year old remains of "Lucy", discovered in Ethiopia 40 years ago.

Responsible Travel

The natural environments that you'll travel through are fragile; the cultures and traditions precious and often the communities we pass through are reliant on tourism. It is our responsibility as visitors to minimise the impact of our presence, protect what is precious and where we can leave a positive impact. Trip gradingAdventure touring

The touring element of this trip visits remote areas where facilities are often basic. These adventure tours will often involve long journeys and rough roads. To enjoy these adventures we suggest reasonable fitness and health, a moderately active lifestyle and a positive attitude. Suggested preparation: Two or three times a week, we recommend you walk on undulating terrain for an hour or more, for at least 3 months prior to departure.

Adventure Travel

By its very nature Charity Challenges involve an element of the unexpected. In remote and developing countries do not expect standards you are used to at home. Remote areas are sometimes unpredictable and itineraries may be altered. To get the most out of your adventure it is important that you are suitably fit, flexible, positive and eager to take on all the challenges that arise. If you are uncertain about your suitability for this trip we recommend that you speak with your charity representative or one of our team.

DAY3 Hamlin's Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital

After breakfast we visit Hamlin's Addis Ababa fistula hospital on the western side of the city. We will have morning tea with key personnel and enjoy a tour of the grounds followed by lunch with the nursing and theatre staff. In the evening we will enjoy dinner at one of the most fabulous cultural restaurants in Addis Ababa, where we will sample the food and drink and enjoy traditional dance.

DAY4 Visit Hamlin College of Midwifes and Desta Mender

This morning we will visit the world famous Hamlin College of Midwives, meet key staff and tour the grounds. Lunch is at the Juniper cafe; a cafe run by past fistula patients. The afternoon is spent at Desta Mender (Joy Village), a farm and training centre for long term fistula patients. Meet staff and residents and learn about education, reintegration and microfinance programs.

DAY5 Fly to Jinka and visit Ari Village

After breakfast, you will be transferred to the airport for the flight to Jinka. We will visit the Ari village, who are the biggest group in the Omo region. Ari women are famous for their pottery which they sell to support their families. Ari villages have neat compounds in fertile and scenic land with coffee plantations. They have large livestock herds and produce large quantities of honey.

DAY 6 Visit Mursi inside Mago National Park, then to Turmi to visit Hamar tribe

This morning we travel to Mago National Park and visit the Mursi people. The Mursi women are famous for the insertion of wooden and terra-cotta discs into the ear lobes and the split and stretching of their lower lips to make room for similar discs. Though these 'lip plates' may appear bizarre to outsiders, the Mursi regard them as signs of beauty. In the afternoon continue to Turmi to visit a Hamer village. The Hamer tribe (also called Hammer or Hamar) is one of the largest groups in the Valley. The Hamer cultivate millet, vegetables, tobacco and cotton as well as raising cattle and goats. They are known for the fine pottery they produce as well as their remarkable hair styling. Most dramatic of all are the clay hair buns with ostrich feathers that the men don when they have killed a fierce animal. These hair buns stay on for 3-6 months at a time. The women wear beaded necklaces and iron coils around their arms and decorate their skin with cowry shells.

Total drive 130kms - approx 3 hours on gravel road 4WD

DAY7 Drive to Konso via visiting the Karo Tribe

This morning we will drive to Koricho, a settlement for the Karo ethnic group. With its lofty views over the Omo River and traditional Karo dwellings, this is perhaps the most beautiful tribal village. The Karo people are famous for their body painting, using locally available vegetable pigments traced in fantastic patterns on each other's faces, chests, arms, and legs. Karo men, as with neighbouring tribes, are also famous for their unique hairstyle. Continue to Konso for overnight.

Drive 185kms - approx 3 hours on gravel road 4WD

DAY 8 Morning visit Konso tribe before driving to Yirgalem

After breakfast, we will visit the Konso tribal village, who have managed to develop a highly specialised agriculture economy and in the process, one of Africa's most fascinating cultures. We also have the chance to visit the Chief of Konso's house and hopefully meet the Chief himself to learn about the tribe and how they live. Continue to Yirgalem for overnight.

Drive 335kms - approx 6 hours on asphalt road 4WD

DAY9 Visit Hamin's Yirgalem fistula hospital and Hamlin-supported Midwifery Clinic

This morning we visit Hamlin's Yirgalem fistula hospital and Hamlin-supported midwifery clinic to see the work being done. This afternoon we have a cultural village visit to see the traditional Sidama and in the evening, there will be a coffee ceremony. If time allows, a walk through the nearby forest is worthwhile. The wildlife you can see includes bushbuck, hyena, baboons and colobus.

DAY 10 Visit twin Lakes Abiata & Shalla

After breakfast, we drive to visit twin lakes Abiata & Shalla, famous for flocks of flamingos and great white pelicans. Abiata is a shallow brackish lake, home to colonies of flamingos. While Lake Shalla is a crater lake that has a depth of about 820 feet and is surrounded by sulphure springs. We plan to take some recommended walks in the areas surrounded by podocarpus and wild fig trees, and full of Columbus Monkeys and many species of birds, seven of which are endemic to Ethiopia.

Continue to Langano for overnight.

DAY 11 Drive Addis Ababa

After breakfast, we will drive back to Addis Ababa.

DAY 12 Great Ethiopian Run 10km

The 2024 Great Ethiopian Run attracts participants of all abilities from all over the world. Celebrated as one of the liveliest and most colourful races in the world, it is Ethiopia's biggest street party, with over 45,000 Ethiopians running, walking and dancing their way along the route, led by Ethiopia's celebrated international runners.

Competing with the staff from Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia will be an experience of a lifetime! For those spectating, you'll be able to be part of the festive and fun atmosphere and be an awesome support crew.

In the evening we will celebrate with dinner at a local restaurant in Addis Ababa.

Country Information

Ethiopia, the 'Horn of Africa', is situated just north of the equator, in north-eastern Africa. Formally known as Abyssinia, it stands between the cultures of the Mediterranean and the tribal people of Africa and boasts the origins of humankind. Ethiopia is one of the largest countries in Africa in terms both area and population. With an area of 1,235,000 square kilometres it is around the size of New South Wales and Victoria combined. The population is fast approaching 100 million – with the densest population living in the fertile central highlands. Ethiopia has been able to keep its own strong independent character and not be marred by the ways of colonists, still retaining ancient cultures untainted by western influences. It is this uniqueness that gives Ethiopia such a magnetic appeal. They are a people with incredible resilience, who show true pride in their culture and civilisation, which is apparent in their many colourful celebrations. Most Ethiopians make a living by farming and cattle-raising and live in the countryside. The highland peoples have followed an ancient biblical, moral and civil code for more than 16 centuries.

Climate

Ethiopia has a very pleasant climate. Hot in summer and cool in winter. Evenings can be cool but prepare for hot African weather during the day.

Dietary Requirements

Provided we are advised in advance of your departure we are able to cater for vegetarian diets and can assist with medically recommended diets (allergies and intolerances). Please ensure you discuss your requirements with us well in advance (at least 1 month prior to your trip) to determine whether we can cater to such dietary requirements on your chosen adventure. Please note that options are likely to be limited in very remote locations or alternatives may be more expensive or unavailable. There may be times when those with special requirements may need to provide their own food. We are unable to guarantee a peanut-free or allergen-free trip, and therefore, we strongly encourage that travellers with life-threatening or severe allergies take all necessary medical precautions to prepare for the possibility of exposure. Passengers must travel with all necessary medications for food allergies and be capable of self-administering these medications.

Q. Am I suited to group travel?

A. We recognise that many of our participants have not been on a 'group trip' before. You can rest assured that our trips are flexible and allow you to do your thing within the framework of the itinerary. We fully recognise your needs as an individual and you will be travelling with likeminded people who have also fundraised for a very worthy cause.

Q. What level of comfort can I expect?

A. We will be staying in three star share accommodation (single rooms may be available at an extra cost). Our accompanying leader and staff will take care of your day to day needs. Travel is in comfortable air-conditioned private vehicles.

Q. How safe is it?

A. Your well-being is our first priority. Our staff constantly review every aspect of your adventure and our expert guides are fully conversant with the demands of travelling in remote regions.

Q. Where do we stay?

A. To capture the essence of your journey we have, wherever possible, selected accommodation with local character. In the cities our hotel rooms are on a twin share basis with private facilities. In remote localities you can expect simple, clean but more basic facilities.

Q. What about environmental impact?

A. We believe that adventure travel revolves around establishing a sound working relationship with the people and environments in which we operate. We believe that you can also make a positive contribution and we urge you to familiarise yourself with our Responsible Tourism Guide before you depart. Every participant receives a copy of this booklet upon registering.

Q. What about the food?

A. We are fully aware of the healthy appetites that build up when touring and provide tasty and varied meals with plenty of fresh ingredients. Our guides will be taking the group to a combination of local and European restaurants. Your good health is our highest priority. We also cater for vegetarians. Please let us know if you have any special dietary requirements at the time of booking.

Q. What is included in my trip?

A. It is our aim to ensure that we incorporate as many inclusions as possible in your trip to minimise any out of pocket expenses while you are away. It is important that you refer to our trips notes for the exact inclusions, as they do vary from challenge to challenge.









Q. Are there any hidden extras or surcharges?

A. Huma Charity Challenge owns most of the operations, which allow us to include all land transport, most meals, accommodation and much of the equipment you will need for your challenge. Consult your detailed trip notes for flight information and contact Huma Charity Challenge for more information. Please note that generally the following items are not included - visas, passport, vaccinations, personal travel insurance, airport and departure taxes, tips and personal expenses.

Q. What if the minimum number of participants is not met?

A. Most of the adventure challenges require a minimum of 8 to 10 participants. If this amount is not reached, Huma Charity Challenge will consult with the charity and decide either to postpone the trip or to charge a small group surcharge if need be. The maximum group size is 16.

Q. Who takes part in a Huma Charity Challenge?

A. Our challenges are available to men and women over the age of 18. Medical checks may be required as directed by Huma Charity Challenge.
